Honored Sir

Presuming that Informations in the line

of my profession will be agreeable Especially coming  
out of the United States Frigate Newyork as being the first  
Ship of the Government sent out of the Eastern Branch and  
under your Directions, being desirous of promoting the  
Good of the service in making you acquainted with incidents  
and Causes which originate diseases in order when in our  
power to have them removed; I shall in this instance of  
the Newyork make it my duty to inform you that since  
We have left Washington Navy yard I have had no less  
from 15 to 30 Sicks on my List chiefly with Scour &  
Dysentery, & the most of them of a very obstinate nature  
hardly one of the men has escaped it and many of the  
officers have been ill with it, I think it then ~~very~~ highly  
necessary to acquaint <sup>you</sup> of this disaster and to inform you  
it is my opinion that it did not proceed from any other  
Cause than that of the River water; which the officers &  
Men were forced to drink in abundance while suffering  
with intense of heat in the River, and no other water or  
but very little could be provided for them -

Therefore precautions ought to be taken when Vessels  
of the Government are either fitting out or lay in fresh water  
Rivers to correct the quality of such waters and to prevent  
the men from drinking it from a Long Sain of the vessel in  
order to avoid as much as possible its dreadful effect, which  
when Epidemical Corey its Calamity through a whole Ship's  
Company -



Company debilitate them to such a degree that near half of them are kept in a state of Invalidity and consequently unfit for any hard duty during one twelve month Cruise.

Zeal and anxiety of our Captains, I presume in obedience to your orders (and their duty of course) in getting out their vessels for service, I suppose prevent them from attending to any precaution & prevent those ill consequences, but they are of a too serious a nature not to be attended to; therefore proper men ought to be spared, stationed or appointed to attend and correct the water in cleaning and burning the casks in Sid, and about half pint of Lime put in to <sup>one</sup> hundred gallons of water which will be sufficient to correct its quality keep it sweet & wholesome; Two have died of the dysentery, one of them having been removed from the Navy yard Hospital to the New Yorks very ill —

Since our arrival in this river I have had Number cases of Bilious fevers of a most Malignant nature, Likewise of Intermitting and or ague fevers in abundance, Diseases peculiar to this season and climate, of the former two have unfortunately fallen victim to its rage, and I am sorry to say that, Shubel Croft, a Sergeant of marine a very good and servicable man is one, and a private the other; our loss of men to this day with that number, and character of Diseases, I am happy to observe is as yet but four, & the number of the sick this day on the list is only fifteen, the <sup>the highest</sup> most of them on recovery; I have the Honor to remain with <sup>the highest</sup> respect & esteem Sir your do<sup>r</sup>.

Sir it has been the usages of most navies to make the Surgeon of a Temporary or Provisional Hospital, do and perform the Duties of a Fleet ~~Surgeon~~ Physician, when the General Health does not require his services on Shore - This, as well to prevent any officers — remaining inactive, as to apprise the Commander in Chief, of the Health of each Ship, in order that there may be no delay in procuring Sick Quarters, should their Number be such a measure expedient, as also, to investigate the causes of any Epidemics in the Fleet or Squadron, so that it may be known, if the internal regulations, as it respects diet, Cleanliness &c., particular Stations, in the influence of Climate, prevailing winds &c., or the particular practice of the Surgeon on board, has had any influence, in producing or ~~increasing~~ increasing the same. So that the Commander in Chief may take the Speediest Measures, not only to check, but prevent the recurrence of a similar Evil - His duties may be thus defined —

- 1<sup>st</sup> He is to be considered as the General Consulting Physician, and Surgeon, as well by the request of a particular Surgeon as by the order of the Commodore —
- 2<sup>d</sup> He is to attend all Surgical operations, when the Situation of the Squadron will admit of it
- 3<sup>d</sup> He is to attend all Medical Surveys, whether Medicine — Hospital Stores &c. —
- 4<sup>th</sup> He is to examine the General watering places of the different Ships in order to analyse, and detect any Noxious qualities, as also to point out the means of ~~Correcting~~ Correcting it
- 5<sup>th</sup> He is to receive the monthly reports of the different Surgeons (in the annexed form) or weekly if the State of the Squadron should require it, from all of which, he is to form a General Report with such Remarks as may to him appear proper —

"on Duty. The Cataracts having been the prevailing Complaints on this  
"on Duty Station, I shall in this Case occupy your attention, and particularly  
" " " " " on those of a phlogistic Character, in this Case I find that Blood  
"on Duty letting more or less according to the nature and height of the Symptom  
" " " " " diaphoretic mixtures, with Spt. Nit. D. & antimonial wine would  
" " " " " in the Course of twenty four hours correct the Diathesis. after  
"on Duty having produced an ease in the System, and an indication of  
"on Duty the necessity of expediting the Excretion of the bile & mucus of the  
"on Duty the Stomach & Lungs, I would then administer two Grains of  
"on Duty Imit. Tart & about two Dracms of antimonial wine, sufficient  
" " " " " to procure three or four vomiting & one or two downy discharges.  
"on Duty this to follow with some mild Diluent Drink, a little warmed  
"on Duty & sweeten, such as Chamomil, Balm, or Barly Tea would likely  
" " " " " promote a gentle perspiration. The patient after this Treatment  
" " " " " being generally relieved from that phlogistic State, would give  
" " " " " an opportunity of passing him a Cathartic Compound of Calamel  
" " " " " & Jalap; I have therefore observed this treatment, to be the best  
" " " " " adapted in this Disease, as in a few Days the patient would  
"on Duty recover his health and be put to Duty  
"on Duty Rheumatic Complaints have been likewise very troublesome

"on Duty self, the R. f. Juice internally administered the Embrocations with

"on Duty The Diarrhoeas on this Station have been of more mild nature  
"on Duty and have often subsided to a vomit, or mild Cathartics, if

The intermittings being still less in number have subsided  
in less than 6 or 8 Days after evacuations and strong Doses of the  
Bark administered at the first of the paroxysms

Sir / Having always thought it necessary and the duty of a Surgeon to lay before his Commander for his information the State of Health of his Ship's Company, the Differences & prevailing Diseases which occur from time to time & to point out as much as possible their Causes & in order when in their power to have them removed, a Rule which I have uniformly observed — towards my former Commanders & Every since I have the honor of belonging to the Navy, & my last Communication to Capt James Barron being on the 1<sup>st</sup> of March last; — I therefore <sup>would</sup> think it a neglect of duty should I deviate from that Line of Conduct; — Consequently Sir I have been the honor (& I hope it will be satisfactory) of informing you that, from that date to this, the ~~present~~ prevailing Diseases — which have chiefly affected our Ship's Company were of a Catarrhal Kind, & the most of them of a Malignant a Nature, mostly Complicated with Rheumatism; a few Shrews, — Diarrhas, Intermitting & 2 Typhus, but fortunately of no contagious a nature, & no Death; and as it was being for the unfortunate accident of the 25<sup>th</sup> of April, I should have the happiness of informing you that none have died. The Ship is kept Clean, Sweet, & wholesome

in these seas, Particularly on this Coast the Dews are Excessively heavy & hurtful, it is then Necessary for the health of the Crew & the benefit of the Service that the officers in watch should keep the men perfectly awake in their Night watches & not to suffer them to lay in a bare Dake, as they would be diseased with various Complaints generally produced from those heavy Dews; I hope I have anticipated your wish & have lay the statements to your satisfaction. Circumstances making it the duty of a Surgeon to lay before his Commander for his information the prevailing Diseases which occurs on Board of the vessel under his Command, and in his opinion their Causes (in order when in their power to have them removed. a practice which I have uniformly observed with my former Commanders.

I therefore think it highly necessary to inform you that from the 23<sup>rd</sup> of October last, the Scourge of a most malignant Character & with the highest symptoms has broken out among our Ship's Company & increases daily; — This Disease arising from a source of Causes, such as an inactivity, a want of a clear circulation of air, Laying on a bare damp Deck, turning in to their hammocks with damp — clothes, a long use of salted provisions & looks flesh, a want of greens & vegetables &c. &c. (a complication of causes — too tedious to enumerate), are such as will, united or separated, originate this Disease, which in its nature is of a very difficult cure particularly at sea, & which when extended becomes Epidemical & covers its calamity through a whole Ship's Company — ~~the~~ Sixteen is the Number of this Complaint on this day's list.
