## Letter from William Bainbridge to John Gwinn, February 5, 1825

## Washington City D.C. 5<sup>th</sup> Feb. 1825

My Dear Sir,

How are you and my dear adopted daughter Caro. and your lovely infant? I often think of you, and my best wishes are constantly with you. I live a forlorn Batchelor's [sic.] life, but hope and long to change it, at least in part. You have without doubt seen the promotion of the passed midshipman, which gave me sincere pleasure. I have faint hopes that some promotions in the other grades, L<sup>t</sup>. & Comd<sup>r</sup>, will take place and I expect August will give us some sloops the next summer. I hope you will all hands be kept very active at the yard. By a letter from L<sup>t</sup> Ward I learn you have the yard in excellent order – you know I like a <u>neat ship</u>. Capn Shubrick will

probably have leave of absence from the yard. And you will then have an op--portunity of playing L<sup>t</sup>. & Cap<sup>n</sup>. and ^if you want a <u>Commodore</u>. You know little <u>Waddy</u> is in the neighbourhood. Remember me affect--tionately to Ward & his amiable wife. Tell W. that I have recv<sup>d</sup> his letter and will write to him soon, although I am becoming a very bad correspondent.

Give my love to my dear family and you may kiss all hands of them for me for on my return to Boston, I shall certainly kiss all yours.

Remember me affectionately to M<sup>rs</sup> G. and kiss the [?] for me Always, your affectionate servant W<sup>m</sup>Bainbridge
